Period pants project

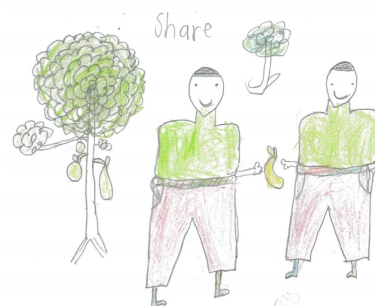
Girls and all female staff at St. John Leonard
