A clean water source was provided by Fulfilling Futures. There is hope for a reduction of waterborne diseases in the school.

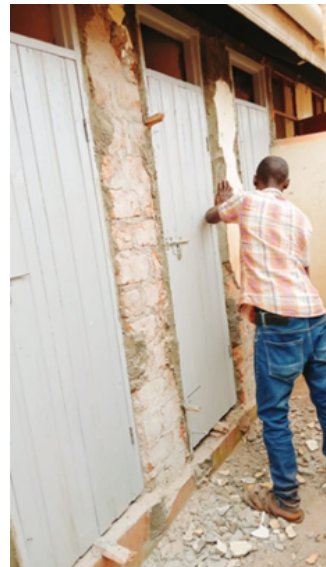

In addition we continue to be able to support 30 children through school and 7 young adults with tertiary education.



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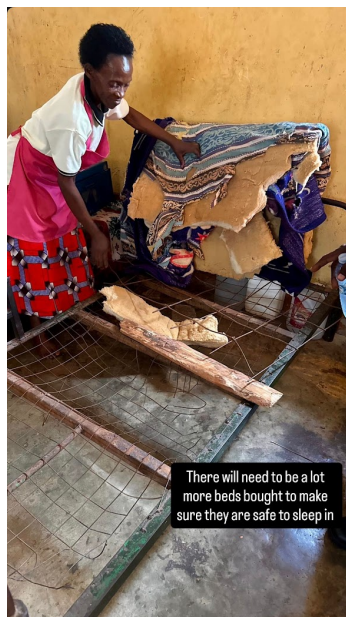
We continue to also be grateful for the work of St Paul's CE Primary School and Brunswick Primary School for the support they give to the charity through their annual art trails.
